Get Cohasset Back!

As I sit here looking at the snow outside my window on this blustery winter day in January, I'm reminded of why I love Cohasset so much and why I question my sanity for remaining here so long. It's 11:30 in the morning. It snowed during the night, and it's still snowing. There are about 5 inches of snow piled up on the ground, trees are leaning over from the weight of the snow, and broken branches are down everywhere. Clean-up is going to be quite extensive.

The snow means water for our wells and creeks, and it's a beautiful picture to look at. Then I look at the road. There hasn't been a plow on Mud Creek Rd. I'm trying to decide whether I need to call Butte County Public Works or not. After the New Year's Day storm and the whoop-la that ensued to get a plow up here, I'm just plain tired of doing the job our county should be doing.

I read all of the Facebook posts that expressed many other residents' frustration with our road conditions on New Year's. I spent the better part of 3 days, along with a couple of my neighbors, hounding Butte Co. Public Works (BCPW) and Supervisor Maureen Kirk, to get the roads taken care of last time it snowed. I agree with everything people said about our lack of services. However, I have come to the unpopular opinion that if we want better services up here, each and every one of us needs to become more proactive about it.

No, we shouldn't have to call BCPW or Maureen Kirk every time there's an ice, snow, dust, traffic, or other road related incident in order to get the services we need, but it seems we do. No one up here is designated to make the call when our road conditions become perilous. That's Highway Patrol's job. Unfortunately, Highway Patrol and Butte County Sheriffs don't get up here often enough to be effective, as far as our road conditions are concerned. BCPW doesn't deem it necessary to even come up and check on the road conditions. Many times, people from these agencies come up as far as the store and then turn around and leave.

In case you haven't noticed, or you are new to the area, Cohasset and its' residents are a non-entity. We have had our school closed, our roads

neglected, and even our zip code reads "Chico" instead of "Cohasset". No, my fellow Cohassians, we do not exist!!!! (Except on the tax roll) I don't know how you feel about this, but I for one, am DAMN MAD!

So, the question is, what do we do about it? Well, being a child of the 60's, I can't sit back and just let this happen. Can you? If you can, then don't complain about any lack of services up here. If you can't, here's what I suggest; I encourage each and every one of you to write, call, or email BCPW, Highway Patrol, Butte County Sheriffs Department, or Maureen Kirk every time you see a road situation that needs attention. Don't stop calling until something is done about the problem. Next, I suggest that everyone in Cohasset start writing "Cohasset" on all of your correspondence. Go to the DMV and insist on "Cohasset" being used on your driver's license. (Yes, you can. And, yes, they will.) Change your address on your bank accounts, bills and/or all legal documents. I am not asking you to do anything that I haven't already done, so I know it's doable.

Chimney Health

Be fire safe at home during these cold nights and sunless days!

Some things to be aware of if you heat with wood: Be sure to check the condition of your stovepipe from time to time! There are some conditions that can shorten the life expectancy and safety of the stove pipe. Obviously, a good quality single wall steel stove pipe inside the home will last for many years. However, three conditions in particular can cause an early failure of stovepipes:

1. Corrosion from acidic condensed flue gases where the flue temperatures appear to be high enough to prevent water condensation
2. The presence of corrosive gases resulting from burning household trash (things like plastics, that when burned, yield hydrochloric and hydrofluoric acids); and
3. Excessive temperatures where a glowing pipe can cause much reduced life expectancy of the metal! Humid weather can also accelerate corrosion of the stovepipe!

It is a good idea to occasionally inspect the exterior of the pipe both visually and tapping it with a mallet or handle end of a screwdriver to discover any weaknesses in the metal before they become a hazard! Another alternative is an annual inspection by a professional chimney sweep to help reveal any faults in the pipe.

Having a slip collar on the interior pipe makes it easy to sweep the entire stack from inside the house, even when it is raining outside. Chimney brushes are available at places like Tractor Supply and some home improvement stores. They also carry heavy fire proof gloves and treatments for creosote buildup that you can add to a hot fire in order to turn creosote (the sticky tar like material in the pipes) to ash. This does not, however, eliminate the need for regular chimney cleaning and inspection! Stay warm and cozy and trouble-free for the rest of this long wet winter!

Excerpt from “A Historical Geography of Cohasset Ridge”

“Early in the 1900’s telephone service to satisfy local needs was improvised by private action with the stringing of connecting wires between residences. This “farmer line” served well and was eventually extended into Chico. After the installation of the power lines static interference developed in telephone reception and requests were initiated for regular public utility telephone service. A matter of economics held back this service until 1955

when Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company ran the lines to serve approximately forty subscribers, at an installation cost of nearly \$100,000.00. The Pacific Gas and Electric Company power poles were used to carry the telephone wires. Cohasset numbers are considered local Chico calls with no toll charges.”
